City Beautiful Planning

- Elements of modern community planning
 - Land use and development
 - Separate areas for industrial and residential uses
 - Plan for public and institutional buildings
 - Lay out streets and neighborhoods for new development
 - Community facilities and natural resources
 - Government buildings, libraries, and museums
 - Electrical utilities
 - Public spaces, "promenades," and places for recreation
 - Parks, natural areas, and street trees
 - Housing
 - Modern and clean housing for working class
 - Design attractive middle class neighborhoods
 - Transportation plan
 - Paved streets and sidewalks
 - Identify corridors for railroad and streetcar lines
