Collective Impact

- Shifting from isolated impact to collective impact is not merely a matter of encouraging more collaboration— Collective Impact is a systemic approach to social impact that focuses on relationships between organizations.
- It's a methodology for change, a disciplined framework for result-focused collaboration.
