




### The Evolution of Regional Planning in the Commonwealth

- 2002 National Governor's Association Policy Academy on LUTED
- 2003 Statewide Conference on *Transportation and Land Use for Economic Development*
- 2004 Statewide Action Plan developed
- 2005 Nine (9) Regional Conferences on *Transportation and Land Use for Economic Development*
- 2006 State contracts with 9 regional agencies to undertake Regional Strategic Plans (1 remains)
- 2007 State contracts with South Central Region to undertake a Regional Strategic Plan
- 2008 Nine (9) Regional Strategic Plans completed
- 2008-2009 State Agencies assisting with implementation of plan priorities

## What is LUTED?

- An innovation An opportunity to undertake a useful measure (if not comprehensive) of planning at a regional scale to:
  - Provoke more coordination and indeed integration of Land Use, Transportation, Economic Development (and conservation). Because of the large scope and impact of these matters, regions make sense as a level for coordination.
  - Identify community and economic development projects that stand out as region-wide priorities.

### What's the Benefit?

- Regions to refine and refocus their planning
  - Zero in on the most critical issues in the region
  - And would work more cooperatively to get important things done
- State agencies to learn what projects are of highest regional priority and impact, and can make direct state financing investments more strategically to those projects AND to learn of ways to better coordinate state investments in LU, T, ED (and conservation).

### **Current Status**

- Nine (9) Regional Plans Completed
- South Central Regional Plan to be Completed by end of Year
- Two (2) regions defined a short list of Priority Investments – State Agencies are working with these regions and communities to implement these projects (Lehigh Valley and Southern Alleghenies)
- One (1) recent priority list submittal and one (1) draft list pending
- Many regions established, or re-established, regional goals and objectives.
- Many regions created a regional priority setting process with specific criteria and measures – of which NC process is a worthy example.
