Collective Impact

- Large-scale social change requires broad cross-sector coordination, yet the social sector remains largely focused on the isolated intervention of individual organizations.
- Shifting from isolated impact to collective impact is not merely a matter of encouraging more collaboration—Collective Impact is a systemic approach to social impact that focuses on relationships between organizations.
- It's a methodology for change, a disciplined framework for result-focused collaboration.

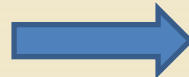

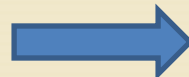
