

**OVER THE PAST YEAR,** the chapter and its sections supported cutting-edge training for professional and citizen planners, held a great conference in Scranton, honored many excellent and innovative planning initiatives with our awards program, and advocated for good planning and legislation in Pennsylvania. We continue to be the voice for planning in Pennsylvania.

#### **Goals for the Next Two Years**

The Chapter Board of Directors met in February 2012, and we briefly discussed our goals for the upcoming term. We'd like to improve communication with the members, make the organization more transparent, implement the strategic plan, promote best practices, make the chapter more visible, improve the capacity of planners to do their work, and develop a culture of planning.

This was just a preliminary discussion, and we'll have a bigger discussion at our June Board meeting, where we'll also need to set priorities.

I have two goals I'll add to the mix – improving planner's access to information on best practices in the state and strengthening the connection between the chapter and the sections.

#### **Budget**

Our 2012 budget is expected to be about \$222,000. It is a very tight budget this year, and, once again, we are not raising our membership fees.

Our largest expenses include approximately \$76,000 for the professional firm that runs the Chapter, \$68,000 for the annual

conference, \$20,000 for printed and web communication, \$10,000 for credit card and other office expenses, and \$8,000 for our legislative outreach efforts.

As one would expect, running the chapter on a day-to-day basis is our biggest expense; it's also our most important, since we couldn't accomplish any of our work without this help. Although the annual conference is very expensive to run, we often receive a lot of revenue to offset or even exceed the expense.

I firmly believe an organization like ours is strongest when the members are involved. We need your good ideas, your energy, and your time. Do you have some thoughts about the chapter

#### We love our "Check Dams" but we also need Land Use Plans!

**THE CREATION OF THE APPALACHIAN TRAIL** is one of the greatest examples of vision, leadership and perseverance in our nation's history and the footpath and Trail experience continue to evolve. No longer simply viewed as a long-distance recreational trail, the Trail today is recognized as a vital economic asset and a critical component in the quality-of-life of the many residents and visitors that use it. As population and development along the eastern seaboard has grown, the landscapes surrounding the Trail have changed. The concept of protecting the Trail for future users has shifted from the narrow perspective of the footpath itself to a broader focus on the land use of surrounding private property and the decision-making of municipal partners.

Preserving the values of the trail by encouraging compatible development and focused conservation efforts around its boundary is the new challenge for the next era in the Appalachian Trail's history.

Given those prospects, the Appalachian Trail Conservancy is embracing this new challenge in conjunction with PA Audubon and the **Kittatinny Ridge Conservation Coalition** in organizing an ongoing effort to protect the Trail experience and the surrounding natural and cultural landscapes. This effort will require the sustained support and cooperation of trail users and club members, adjacent landowners, local communities, public agencies and nonprofit organizations.

#### How can you get involved?

Planning professionals are key allies in addressing these challenges along the Pennsylvania section of the Appalachian Trail. You can support this effort by providing pro bono or reduced rate technical assistance to local conservation planning and trail-related efforts. Skills needed may include land use planning, land use law, geographic information systems (GIS), conservation science, historic preservation, grant writing, communications or graphic design. Scenarios may include providing model ordinances for our online clearinghouse; providing grant-writing or technical assistance to a municipality developing a local open space and greenways plan; or working with a community to develop a tourism strategy based on natural, cultural, and historic assets.

# East Goshen Earns Planning Education Award

East Goshen Township in Chester County is the first recipient of Chester County 2020's "Excellence in Planning Education Award." The award was established to recognize municipalities whose planning commission members have all earned a Master Planner Certificate for having completed 30 hours of planning instruction in PMPEI courses sponsored by the organization.

**SENYA ISAYEFF,** Chairman of the East Goshen Board of Township Supervisors, accepted the award from **Judy DiFilippo,** Chair of the Chester County Planning Commission and Chester County 2020 Treasurer at the November convention of the Chester County Association of Township Officials.

Chester County 2020 is a non-profit group founded in 1996 with the mission of connecting the region's residents, business, and political leaders in cooperative efforts to forestall contention and address critical issues affecting the region's future as a livable community. Since 2004, with the Chester County Planning Commission and West Chester University's School of Business and Public Affairs, they have sponsored the Master Planner Certificate Program and graduated scores of "master planners," but this is the first time an entire planning commission has earned the certificate. Chester County 2020 Executive Director William



**Stevens** says that several other municipalities are just a member or two away from also earning the Award.

He explains that the award is given to a municipality when 100% of planning commission members have completed three PMPEI courses. The Excellence in Planning Education award will be made when municipalities qualify and will be presented at the venue and event of their choice. When new commission members are appointed, as soon as they sign up for master planner classes, the municipality will be re-qualified. "There is room on the EPE award to add additional name plates," says Stevens. He adds that municipalities outside Chester County that enroll in the Master Planner Program are also eligible to receive the Excellence in Planning Education Award.



# 47th World Congres

In 2011, I was invited to lead an international panel at the 2011 International Society of City and Regional Planners – **ISOCARP** – 47th World Congress in China. The event, "Liveable Cities – Urbanizing World, Meeting the Challenge," centered on planning issues of intensive development and the consequents of rapid urbanization.



I'm pleased to share some information about the congress as well as photos from the trip. I directed the panel entitled Building Sustainable Networks, exploring topics on riverfront redevelopment, ecological greenways and green networks, expansion of regional urban space based on green smart growth, how people use and perceive urban open spaces, linking non-urbanized areas and eco-sustainable planning, as well as opportunities to develop low carbon urban spaces and green city clean waters program.

The event took place in Wuhan, China and reflected the central problem of the acknowledged world wide phenomena of the exponential and inexorable inward flow of people to cities and the consequent rapid expansion of urban development. The congress brought together participants from 37 countries, 88 papers were explored and discussed in five workshops, and case studies from more

than 60 cities were presented to the audience.

Cities and urban areas around the world are experiencing radical social and swift physical transformations. Global phenomena and universally accepted development visions and aspirations countries and regions share across the world, are steadily creating a different scene for urban

  topics. The new PODO will work with Section
  Chairs to select committee members from around
  the state. The committee can choose its focus
  areas and can choose to meet in person or by conference call. Within the chapter structure, each
  section has an elected planning official member
  and these individuals may provide helpful assistance in building the Planning Officials Development Committee.

• The PODO should be an individual who serves on the planning commission or Zoning Hearing Board in a local community. The individual may be a professional planner as well.

#### **Student Representative**

The Student Representative must be a full-time student enrolled in a planning or planning-related program at either the undergraduate or graduate level.

The Student Representative roles and responsibilities include the following. The Student Rep is also encouraged to explore additional opportunities.

- The Student Rep serves on the PA Chapter of APA Board of Directors which consists of elected members from around the state, and several appointed positions. The Student Rep is appointed by the PA APA Executive Committee.
- The primary responsibility of the Student Representative is to advise the Board and the Chapter on the conduct of services to students and the evolving character of the planning profession.

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The PA Chapter of APA is pleased to announce several changes planned for our communications, scheduled for implementation during the first half of 2012.

#### Website Redesign:

A full-scale website redesign is currently underway.
